

Family Bereavement Groups

The Alcove offers activity-based peer support groups for children, teens and adult caregivers who are grieving the death of a loved one. Children receive care and support in a safe environment where they can express themselves through play, art, storytelling and music.

Peer support groups foster open, honest discussion of the feelings of sadness, fear, anger and confusion that accompany a loss.

Groups meet every other week throughout the year, with sessions lasting one and a half hours.

An evening begins with sharing a light meal together and then break out into age specific groups for activities and group discussions.

We offer five age groups:

- Ages 3-6
- Ages 7-10
- Ages 11-14
- Ages 15-18
- Adult Groups

A "Juvenile Family Crisis" is a legal term for family problems such as parent-teen conflict, running away, truancy, or other behaviors or conditions which endanger the family unit. The Juvenile Family Crisis Center is a legally mandated service providing a 24-hour quick response to Atlantic County residents. The program is designed to provide early intervention to assist families who are experiencing serious difficulties in managing the behavior of their adolescent children (ages 12-17).

Staff provide assistance to Atlantic County youth (ages 12-17) and their families in obtaining substance abuse assessments, short-term counseling and continuing care.

There are federal grants up to \$5000 and State of New Jersey grants up to \$4000. A recipient cannot get both grants but either grant may be used in addition to Pell Grants

Other non-monetary training opportunities include Tuition Free Waivers at Public Colleges where participants simply pay for books, materials, and fees.

The Coalition for a Safe Community started in 2010 with a concerned group of citizens, public officers, law enforcement agencies, faith-based and other organizations determined to take action to combat crime and violence. In the past, some members had come together on a "specific task" and then disbanded. And at times, a function of any Coalition may be loose associations in which members work for a short time to achieve a specific goal or goals and then disband.

Recently, there has been a lot of negativity in our national media, which has affected everyone. Many of the com- munities who made national headlines lacked a strong community police relationship, and in several cases, it was the lack of diversity, community and police relationships, and/or a lack of representation that created these issues. The police community relations in minority communities has historically been less than ideal. Many of the urban disturbances since the 60's have evolved from police-related confrontations or violence in response to tense situations. However, the Coalition is working to advance positive associations and relations with police in order to create a "stronger, more proactive" police presence in local communities.

The Coalition has taken a proactive approach in creating an atmosphere of cooperation, understanding and open communication between residents and law enforcement. This interaction between community groups is critical and steps taken by the Coalition to achieve this goal include:

• Sponsored a series of meetings (to develop a clearer understanding) between law enforcement officials, community, religious /civic leaders and youth,

• Participated in Chief Henry White's community initiatives to bring law enforcement and community closer together in Atlantic City,

• Shared these efforts with community members through media outlets including: WEHA Gospel radio station, with weekly updates and appearances on other media outlets,

• Established a collaboration with Atlantic County Prosecutor Jim McClain by bringing the State's "Violence Commission" to Atlantic City to hold their first ever public hearing, and

• Joined United Way in their efforts to lead an agency summit working toward a coordinated response to the economic crisis resulting from recent casino closings.

Our addictions specialists offer counseling to our kids who are struggling with addictions or are in recovery and teach preventative didactic classes...

Youth Advocacy Center

Our attorneys represent our young people in civil legal matters, including immigration, housing, public benefits, and are advocates for our youth in the criminal justice system. From obtaining Identification to becoming emancipated, our attorneys provide an array of much needed services to the kids. In addition, the Youth Advocacy Department is responsible for helping to create the Tuition Waiver Bill and the Homeless and Runaway Youth Act.

Pastoral

Our Pastoral Minister provides spiritual guidance to our young people. Although our roots are in the Catholic Church, we are non-denominational and we accept youth of all religious faiths. <u>The WIC Breastfeeding Initiative</u> helps WIC clients in South Jersey achieve their breastfeeding goals through education, advocacy and support.

Lactation consultants and peer educators help WIC clients interested in breastfeeding their baby. Staff travels to prenatal and pediatric clinics, maternity units in hospitals and WIC agencies for one-on-one personalized assistance. Staff provide information, problem solving and equipment at no charge for WIC clients who meet eligibility guidelines.

Post Wellness Initiative (PWI)

Nearly 85% of all mothers experience some form of depression after giving birth. To help South Jersey families meet this very common, very real challenge, SNJPC offers a range of services to support the improved diagnosis and treatment of perinatal mood disorders.

Long concerned with perinatal mental health, the agency accelerated its postpartum depression (PPD) services in response to a 2006 New Jersey law that requires all pregnant women to be educated about PPD and screened for the disease.

The Cooperative provides public and professional PPD education, works to improve access to treatment services, and helps providers to comply with the education and screening mandates of the new state law.

The Perinatal Addictions Prevention Project provides professional education, professional training, and consumer education about the effects of alcohol and drug use during pregnancy. <u>The Infant and Family Development Program (IAFD)</u> is a free service for new parents who may need help caring for their baby.

IAFD offers help for new parents in three ways:

Parenting Education

- Answers questions about feeding, health care, and discipline.
- Offers support in obtaining other services such as WIC, Medicaid, or SSI.

Developmental Screening

- In-home follow-up to see if your baby is growing and learning at a normal pace.
- Activities to help a baby or child catch up with other children his or her age.

Medical Follow-up

- Information on how to tell when your baby needs a doctor.
- Help making sure your baby is properly immunized.

How to participate

Any family who lives in Atlantic County and meets eligibility criteria can participate.
